Election Procedure:-

PREVIOUS MEETINGS

At the September meeting Peter Joseph gave an illustrated talk entitled 'Sark's Hope Mine' explaining the discovery, development and sociology of this unusual mine. Sark's Hope Mine is located on Little Sark,

which is part of the Channel Island of Sark. This mine worked from 1833 to 1845 and employed some 80 miners many of them Cornish. Mining for silver, lead and copper took place on Little Sark and there were several mines.

Steve Polglase explained the geology, development and working of the fascinating mines which occur in and around the Godolphin Estate at the October meeting. Godolphin Mine is one of the oldest Cornish Mines of which records exist. The mine sits in the great mining area north west of Tregonning Hill surrounded by other mines such as West Godolphin, Tindene and Great Work.

In November "The Slide Show on the Mines in the St Just Area" was cancelled and Vice Chairman Kevin Baker gave an interesting talk about the National Association of Mining History Organisations (NAMHO), of which he is a former chairman.

In December, 23 members were present for the Members Medley which was introduced by Vice Chairman. Kevin Baker.

The first item was entitled "Beneath the Smoke" and given by Frank Kneebone. The subject was about exploring the inner-most reaches of the flue of the boiler house at King Edward. Accompanied by a series of photos, theories were expressed as to how the boiler had been fitted and the flue used. It was estimated that this was the first time the inner part of the flue had been visited since 1938.

Next came an item about the Keweenaw Peninsula in Michigan, USA, presented by George Wilson. the Power Point Unfortunately presentation was not compatible to the KEM system and George, being the consummate professional, gave us an outline of the content. His daughter has been doing some archaeological research in the Keweenaw area, where a number of Cornish Miners emigrated in the nineteenth century and she had wanted to show a comparison with the remains there to those in Cornwall. This was a topic worthy of a longer exposition, so hopefully George can be persuaded to do it again.

Under the guises of a WORD SEARCH, Peter Benbow quizzed members on their knowledge of Smelters marks and names. This was

generally a light-hearted topic, with several references to High Tide mark at Bissoe. It seems that rising sealevels were a problem even in ancient times.

The evening was rounded off by a comprehensive pictorial display of a Society trip to the Lee Moor china clay works in 2007 by Steve Barber. We were shown slides of the extraction process through dry mining and its subsequent refining process. This was another item worthy of a longer session, especially as production has now ceased.

Clive Benney, a noted historian on many aspects of the Cornish village of St Agnes, gave a talk on "The Harbour and the Ship Building of St Agnes" at the first meeting of 2013. As well as describing the history and development of St Agnes, he spoke about the impact of ship building on the village and local mines and mining activity and their relationship to the once busy harbour of St Agnes.

In February Allen Buckley, a noted mining historian who has researched and written a book about the mining around Chacewater, described the mining of ore in the Chacewater area. There were numerous early mines around Chacewater, but the two survivors were Killifreth and Wheal Busy. Allen described these mines up to closure in 1927.

BOOK REVIEWS

So Very Foolish

A History of the Wherry Mine, Penzance By Peter Joseph £4.99

Through the long history of the Cornish minerals industry, mining was undertaken in some remarkable locations but none was stranger than the Wherry Mine at Penzance. With its shafts some 200 yards offshore in Mounts Bay linked by a timber trestle to its machinery on dry land, the Wherry Mine resembled more a seaside pier than a working industrial site.

The unique nature of the workings meant that contemporary travellers in Cornwall took note of the Wherry Mine and some recorded their impressions, but curiously, until now there has been no attempt to record its full history.
